### **Al Swingle**

I feel honored to be nominated for the Call Committee and feel that if I am elected, I can make an important contribution toward selecting the future pastor for our congregation. Since I have been interviewed by call committees of churches in the past, perhaps I can bring a unique perspective to our call process.

I am a retired ELCA pastor and live on Capitol Hill with my wife Nancy. I have been a member of Reformation since we moved here in 2005. During my years of pastoral ministry, I served as a missionary in Liberia, West Africa; a parish pastor of two different congregations in Ohio; and as a full-time hospital chaplain in Toledo, Ohio. At Reformation I am involved in many areas of congregational life including worship whenever possible. In addition, some specific aspects include assisting leading worship, doing minor repairs of the building, and visiting shut-ins.
